



US-Iran Sign Virtual Agreement to Ease Tensions

A memorandum aimed at reducing ongoing tensions between the United States and Iran has reportedly been signed virtually, according to CNN.

Citing a senior U.S. administration official, the report says President Donald Trump and Vice President J.D. Vance signed the agreement online, while Iran was represented by Parliament Speaker Mohammad Bagher Ghalibaf.

The agreement reportedly includes provisions to lift certain U.S. sanctions related to Iranian ports, resume normal shipping in the Strait of Hormuz, and begin new nuclear talks within the next two months.

However, full details of the deal have not yet been made public. The White House said the document may be released after an official announcement. Differences in interpretation between Washington and Tehran have also emerged regarding the management of the Strait of Hormuz.

Reacting to the agreement, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said that he does not fully align with Trump on several issues. Meanwhile, tensions between Israel and Hezbollah continue in southern Lebanon, according to reports.
